


PDP-Personality Development Programme

follow the guidelines set by the CISCE, New Delhi, and NCERT. Additionally, we have incorporated the following concepts into our curriculum as recommended by the NEP'2020:

I would like to provide you with some insights into these concepts.

Bagless days are designated days where students can engage in experiential learning, hands-on activities, field trips, workshops, and community-based projects, fostering holistic development, creativity, and critical thinking.

Foundational Literacy and Numeracy (FLN) is aimed at building strong foundational skills in reading, writing, and mathematics during early schooling. We personalize learning and use diagnostic assessments and targeted interventions to enhance FLN, which prepares students for lifelong learning.

The Holistic Progress Card is a record of a child's learning and progress in all domains of learning achievement and development. It tracks students' progress in essential

Financial literacy equips students with practical knowledge about money management, budgeting, savings, and investments. We have incorporated financial literacy into the curriculum, teaching students about financial concepts and responsible behaviour. This prepares students for real-world financial decisions and economic independence.

Experiential learning emphasizes "learning by doing" rather than passively absorbing information. Students engage in hands-on activities, experiments, projects, and real-world problem-solving, cultivating critical thinking, creativity, collaboration, and adaptability. Integrating experiential learning enriches the educational experience and prepares students for practical challenges.

Toy-based pedagogy and Jadui Pitara are innovative concepts that introduce play-based learning teaching materials. Jadui Pitara is tailored for children aged 3 to 8 years and covers physical, socio-emotional, ethical, cognitive, language, literacy, aesthetic, and cultural aspects. The NCF emphasizes the importance of play in curriculum organization, pedagogy, and overall child experience.



Annual Exhibition 2024













"Everything is theoretically impossible until it is done"- with this motto St. Francis Xavier School organized the Annual Exhibition on 30th March, 2024.

It was a spectacular showcase of scientific experiments, captivating the minds of attendees with a diverse array of demonstrations. Featuring a wide range of interactive exhibits, the exhibition catered to visitors of all ages from Primary to Senior Secondary.

The topic for the **Primary section** was 'One India - Incredible India', which showcased the development in the different sectors in India such as space, agriculture, defence, transportation, and sustainable development in various fields. It also included the cultural features of different states such as dance, festivities, and food. This exhibition aimed to enlighten the students and visitors on the contribution of the different states to make India an incredible nation. The teachers guided the students to prepare charts and models on the given topic. Charts and models on DRDO Akash, INS Vikramaditya, Mission Sakti, Tejas, Chandrayan, Mangalyaan, NAVIC, underwater metro in Kolkata, Bogibeel bridge, Pamban, Bridge, windmills, solar powerplants were a part of the display.

The physics department demonstrated working models like Temperature Detector, Dual Control Switch, Chandrayan 3, Satellite Communication System, Earthquake Alarm, Rain Detector, Smoke Absorber, Room Heater, Tesla Coil, and Newton's Cradle. There were hands-on activities that provided an immersive experience, allowing visitors to witness the concepts of Physics in action and gain insights into their practical applications. The exhibition ventured into the realm of modern physics, captivating the audience with charts on Light, Green Hydrogen, Nuclear Power Plant, Robotics, and the Scientific Resemblance of Ancient Monuments. These topics sparked curiosity and ignited discussions, as visitors explored the cutting-edge advancements and scientific marvels shaping our world today.

As a part of Biology and Geography exhibits, students of Class XI made working models of Acid Rain, Hemodialysis, Drip Irrigation, and Genetic Engineering. They also made a chart on Epigenetics and a model of different types of fungi. Students of Classes VI to IX made beautiful working and non-working models of heart, skin, Connecting Link (Archeopterix), kidney and many other informative models.

The students from the **History** Department prepared charts and models based on the idea of the Renaissance and Industrial Revolution. Charts and models related to the development of Science and Mathematics were also



on display -the Telescope, Printing Machine, Cotton Gin, Steam Engine, UNESCO Contributions to science, the Delhi Iron Pillar, the Atomic structure proposed by Kanad, Jantar Mantar, and many more.

The students showcased their mathematical acumen in various aspects. The idea of architecture, sculpture, painting, and metal casting were based on mathematical calculations and geometrical views.

For Mathematics, The students of Classes VI to XII made working models on linear programming problems, geoboard, height and distance, area and circumference of a circle, and bar graph on real-life situation data critical reasoning questions were quizzed, and case-based situations and real life problems- the new trend of CISCE were discussed through PPT presentations. Charts were made on Pythagoras theorem and its applications, algebraic formula, square root by spiral method, determination of pi by model, fraction and triangle properties were highlighted.

The Computer Laboratory was decked up beautifully by the students with dynamic charts on eras of computing, features of different programming, Robotics, etc. The students from Classes VI to IX and XI showcased elaborate models using Arduino, explaining the Internet Of Things.

The Chemistry department also showcased its achievements. The students of Classes VI to XII made working models on volcanoes, rainwater harvesting, pH tests, side effects of medicine, lava lamps, water marbling, chemical sunset, acid rain, and distillation of water for the **Chemistry Exhibition.** The students explored the colloidal nature of Sulphur and how the Redox reaction stems the application of Breath analyzer to enable the authorities to catch the wrongdoers.

The Exhibition was a grand success which is attributed to its ability to seamlessly blend education, entertainment, and innovation.

TRAVELOGUE Dhanushkodi: The Ghost Town at India's Edge



History of Dhanushkodi:

Dhanushkodi, also known as the "Land's End," lies on the Pamban Island in South India. It connects to mainland Tamil Nadu via the iconic Pamban Bridge. Historically, Dhanushkodi holds significance as the place where Lord Rama instructed Hanuman to build the "Ram Setu" bridge to Sri Lanka. Once a thriving trade hub, it stood 24 kilometers north of Sri Lanka. However, in 1964, a powerful cyclone struck Rameswaram and Pamban Island, forcing the residents of Dhanushkodi to abandon their homes. The town was left uninhabited, and today, it stands as a haunting ghost town. The remnants of its past glory include temples, houses, a lighthouse, a school, a hospital, and even a railway station with tracks extending to the southernmost point of India. The only inhabitants are local fisherfolk. They live harsh lives in makeshift thatched huts with no electricity or running water.

Last summer we had the opportunity of visiting this magnificent place.

Crossing Pamban Bridge:

The train journey from Mahabalipuram to Rameshwaram was an amazing one as we crossed the Pamban bridge with our heart in our mouth. Though one could drive there but nothing could come up to the experience of crossing the bridge. You should experience it by train, in at least one direction, as the railway line lies spectacularly close to the sea. We stood by the door as the train inched across the bridge, trying to capture every moment on camera. At one point I was truly frightened of falling off the train!

The same day we planned to visit Dhanuskodi but the locals at our resort convinced us that we should visit the next day with some time in hand. The essence of the old town else would not be felt.



Driving through the Rameswaram - Dhanushkodi Road:

The next day we hired a car and took the scenic road that leads to Dhanushkodi. The landscape was both severe and serene, offering glimpses of the vast ocean.

The new road has made Dhanushkodi much more accessible. Before it was constructed, the only way to reach the town was to take a private minibus or jeep across the sand or walk along the seashore. It was totally cut off from civilization. Now, one can drive there directly in a private vehicle.

The road is an extension of National Highway 87, which runs from the mainland to Pamban Island and Rameshwaram. Previously, it ended at Mukuntharayar Chathiram but now continues 5 kilometers from Mukuntharayar Chathiram to Dhanushkodi, and a further 4.5 kilometers from Dhanuskhodi to Arichal Munai (Erosion Point). The final stretch is strictly controlled by India's Border Security Force. Entry is only permitted from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Travel time from Rameshwaram to Dhanushkodi took us about 30-45 minutes by car. There are various travel options available depending on your budget.

The cheapest option is to take the state government bus from the bus stop near Agni Theertham in Rameshwaram. The frequency of buses is approximately every 30 minutes and the last bus returns just before 6 p.m. However, the drawback is that you won't be able to stop at other tourist spots, such as temples, along the way. Taking an auto rickshaw is an alternative option.

Exploring the Ghost Town of Dhanushkodi:

As we reached our destination we felt that we had reached the end of the earth. Once a flourishing trade hub, Dhanushkodi is now an eerie ghost town. All that exists of it are the fragmented and windswept remains of a few buildings, stark and seemingly out of place in the severe yet serene landscape. The best-preserved ones are the church, post office, and railway station. Railway tracks are also buried under the sand. The remnants of the church and the town created an eerie feeling and we were as if transported back to the past. The feeling could not be described in words. While the stone remnants of Dhanushkodi are the main attraction, the best thing to do is simply soak up the soul-stirring and sometimes haunting atmosphere. After spending a considerable amount of time exploring the town, we finally drove towards the beach.



Dhanushkodi Beach:

We continued along the road to Arichal Munai (Erosion Point). It's a magical scene, with the straight strip of tarmac enclosed by the sea on both sides. A solitary pillar of Ashoka, the national emblem of India, stands at the endpoint where you can look out across Adam's Bridge. Standing at the southernmost tip of India and gazing across the waters toward Sri Lanka....it's a surreal experience. Don't be surprised if your cell phone automatically connects to Sri Lanka's network. Mine did!

It was extremely windy as we strolled along the pristine beach, where the Indian Ocean meets the Bay of Bengal. The turquoise waters on one side and the emerald on the other along with the sandy shores created a mesmerizing backdrop.

By noon we were ravenous and upon the insistence of our driver cum guide-Balaji- we indulged in fresh seafood at local eateries. Not being a fish lover, I was apprehensive initially but the coastal flavors were a delight to the palate.

Villoondi Theertham

While you're in the vicinity, consider visiting Villoondi Theertham. The name translates to "the place pierced by the arrow." Legend says that Lord Ram quenched the thirst of Sita by piercing a point in the sea from where sweet water splurted. Here, you'll find a Shiva lingam named Thryambakeshvarar. Devotees can access the well by crossing a 120-foot-long walking bridge that extends into the sea. The sacred water and the serene surroundings make it a peaceful spot for reflection and prayer.

Kothandaramaswamy temple, located off the highway about 10 minutes before Dhanushkodi, is of interest too. It's dedicated to Lord Ram and notably is the only building in the area to have survived the cyclone that destroyed the town.

Best Time to Visit Dhanushkodi






IN CONVERSATION WITH MRS. GARGI BANERJEE
